











Implementation Timeline




Federal Infrastructure Funding by Recipient Type

Funding Mechanism Examples



- **\$370 Million** awarded in FY2022 and FY2023 via the FTA Ferry Service for Rural Communities Program to the Alaska DOTPF.
 - Projects are selected annually by the FTA through a national competitive funding process.
 - Awarded projects include MV Tustumena Replacement, AMHS operations support, dock upgrades for rural communities



- **\$1.0 Billion** awarded through Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program
 - The Alaska Broadband Office will distribute BEAD funding through a subgrant program.
 - Estimated completion of universal service by 2029, four years after final BEAD funding is awarded




- **\$671 Million** awarded for US Army Corps of Engineers Civil Works projects.
 - Alaska Coastal Erosion Mitigation (Utqiagvik), Lowell Creek Flood Diversion (Seward), Moose Creek Dam Flood Damage Reduction (Chena River/Interior)

Oil and Gas

\$1.16 Billion 18% of Total Spending

- Investments on Alaska's North
 Slope include the largest new oil
 developments in decades
 - Santos' Pikka Phase One
 - ConocoPhillips' Willow Project



Utilities

\$700 Million 11% of Total Spending

- Increased spending driven by federal funding opportunities
 - Statewide broadband
 - Water and sanitation projects
 - Electric grid buildouts
- Major multi-year projects include
 - Makushin Geothermal Power Project (Unalaska)
 - GCI's Aleutian Fiber Project
 - DEC/ANTHC rural water & sanitation projects, statewide





Hospitals & Healthcare

\$260 Million 4% of Total Spending

- Work continues on multi-year projects
 - SEARHC's Sitka Community Hospital
 - ANTHC Anchorage Emergency Services department expansion
- Providence will complete the construction of two large projects in Anchorage
 - Eagle Street Providence Alaska House
 - Crisis Stabilization / Behavioral Health Urgent Care Center



Mining

\$165 Million 3% of Total Spending

- Alaska's six large producing mines will continue to make capital investments.
- Kinross completed key infrastructure construction at Manh Choh in 2023, production expected in 2024
- Federal decision on the Ambler Access Road project delayed





Other Basic Industry

\$90 Million1% of Total Spending

- Alaska's strong visitor volume expected to continue
- Downturn in seafood prices impacts capital spending
- New cruise docks around the state in various stages of development
 - Whittier and Klawock cruise docks expected to open for the 2024 visitor season
 - Permitting for the Juneau Àak'w Landing project approved in 2023
- Pike's Waterfront Lodge multi-year hotel & boat launch expansion project

- Routine maintenance expected across seafood processing plants.
- Substantial new projects, such as Trident's Dutch Harbor processing plant construction, put on hold





Residential

\$405 Million 6% of Total Spending

- High mortgage rates and material costs continue to impact demand
- Repairs for homes damaged by Typhoon Merbok continue in Western Alaska



Other Industrial & Commercial \$360 Million 6% of Total Spending

- Businesses in the sector will continue investing in upgrades, renovations, and new facilities
- Construction of the Northlink Aviation air cargo terminal at Anchorage International will continue
- Retail renovations will occur statewide
 - Three Bears will continue expansion in the Interior







Highways & Roads

\$805 Million
13% of Total Spending

- Near-term federal highway funding increases
- High project costs
- Notable projects for 2024 include
 - Improvements to the Sterling, Alaska, Glenn, Seward, and Richardson Highways
 - Continuing work on the road from Kotzebue to Cape Blossom



National Defense

\$600 Million
10% of Total Spending

- USACE continues focus on restoration and modernization of existing infrastructure
 - Examples include Kodiak Coast Guard Base work
- Civil works projects
 - Moose Creek Dam Barrier project near North Pole
 - Kenai Bluffs bank stabilization
 - Lowell Creek flood diversion in Seward
 - Coastal erosion mitigation in Utqiagvik
 - JBER Runway Extension





Airports, Ports, Harbors, & Railroad \$565 Million 9% of Total Spending

- Improvements to taxiways, runways, and facilities at airports across the state
- Alaska Railroad will break ground on bridge, track, and tunnel rehabilitation projects
- Multi-year port and harbor construction projects
 - Port of Alaska Modernization Project
 - Deep water port development in Nome
 - Multi-purpose dock reconstruction in Skagway
 - Lutak Dock rebuild in Haines
 - Cold Bay dock replacement



Education

\$335 Million 5% of Total Spending

- Capital costs for K-12 education facilities are shared between the State of Alaska and local governments
- UAF's Rasmuson Library Student Success Center opening summer 2024
- Yup'ik Language Center Building at UAF's Kuskokwim Campus expansion for Nursing and Allied Health Program





Other State & Local Government \$535 Million 8% of Total Spending

- Increased spending on projects and expenditures not captured in other public sector categories
- Major projects in this category include
 - Palmer Library reconstruction
 - Fairbanks Polaris Hotel abatement
 - Development of a certified Veterans Cemetery in the Fairbanks Area
 - Construction and renovations to State of Alaska public use cabins construction & renovations



Other Federal Government


\$380 Million
6% of Total Spending

- Additional federal funding will be deployed through various governmental and nonprofit entities in Alaska
- Funding awarded to Alaska's Regional Housing Authorities for residential projects
- Denali National Park Pretty Rocks Landslide road repairs and replacement

2023 Employment


Up 3-4% based on early data (+600 jobs)

Annual Occupational Growth, 2020-2030






Construction Workforce Demographics

Federal infrastructure funding has **begun deployment**, spending will continue through FFY2031 and beyond





\$6.4 Billion in estimated 2024 spending, up from 2023 projection


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
